ARE THERE ANY LOST PEOPLE TODAY? **Mark Lindley**

The question above is one that needs to be considered. It seems as if there are no lost people in the world today. A prevalent doctrine of our day is that one can be saved as a Jew, Muslim, Buddhist, Catholic, protestant or "other." In fact, one can die, having no religious beliefs or convictions, and at the funeral service it will be stated: "Mr. (insert a name) has gone home to be with the Lord in heaven." Are there no lost people today?

Please understand that this writer does not claim to be the judge of any person's soul. God, alone, is the judge (John 5:22; Acts 17:30-31). 6:16-18; II Thessalonians 1:6-9). Surely, those professing to be Christians would agree that fallible and finite people are not qualified to judge the eternal destiny of others (II Corinthians 5:10). Since we do not possess the credentials to judge the souls of others, surely we should not judge irreligious folk to be saved.

Judging works both ways. Some affirm that we should not judge people to be lost; yet, those same people "judge" people to be saved. One is not consistent who teaches that we should not judge, while at the same time "judging" people to be saved. However, this type of judging is so common that it seems no one is lost.

We should understand that simply teaching what the Bible teaches is not judging the eternal destiny of souls. Is it judging when a police officer stops someone who is speeding and explains to the driver that he was exceeding the speed limit? Of course not. The officer is not "judging"; he is simply telling the driver what is written in the law. By that same principle, when one says what the Bible teaches, one is not judging. He is simply telling others what is written in God's law, the Bible.

But what does the Bible teach about the saved and the lost? Does it teach that everyone will be saved? Did Jesus teach that Hinduism is just as legitimate as Christianity? Does the Bible teach that those who reject Christ will be saved? No. it does not.

That truth is that people still sin and are lost without Christ (Romans 3:23; 6:23; John 14:6). The Bible teaches that obedience to the gospel is the only way a sinner can be saved (Romans
